Rise Up with Courage

Welcome back from Christmas break! Hopefully you experienced peace, happiness, and joy over the holidays; plus at least one "long winter's nap."

The week before Christmas break was interesting, to say the least. Inclement weather impacted all of us, social media 'challenges' dis-

rupted school life, and the Omicron COVID-19 variant brings a new wave of health concerns. For nearly two years now, we have had regular reminders that:

"Getting up in the morning is not for the faint of heart. The demands on us are many; the hours in the day are still capped at

twenty-four. We get tugged, secondguessed, pulled in different directions, and at the end of the day we are left wondering what happened. And sometimes it seems like those are the good days" (Uncommon, Tony Dungy, p. 29.)

I am profoundly grateful to work with professionals like each of you who have the courage to rise up each day, face the demands and challenges of life, and serve our students. Your commitment to courage reminds me of two historical figures who both faced extreme challenges and drew similar conclusions about 'courage.'

President Franklin D. Roosevelt battled the effects of polio, while guiding the country through the Great Depression and World War II. He stated that "courage is not the absence of fear, but rather the assessment that something else is more important than fear."



Nelson Mandela was imprisoned for twenty-seven years, followed by governmental roles where he focused on ending apartheid. Mandela said he "learned that courage was not the absence of fear, but the triumph over it. The brave man is not he who does not feel afraid, but he who conquers that fear."

Thank you for recognizing that meeting the emotional, physical, and academic needs of our students is "more important than fear" and rising up with courage to triumph over TikTok trials, a perpetual pandemic, and wintery weather.

We will continue to face difficulties, but the future is bright for our communities and our nation because of courageous educators like you who are dedicated to doing what is right for our children. After all, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world" (Nelson Mandela).



Thinking of retiring at the end of 2021-22?

Nebo is once again offering an Early Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education at least four months prior to their retirement. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by at the end of the 2021-22 school year, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
 - January 7, 2022, to receive \$1,000 in their January 31 paycheck, or
 - February 4, 2022, to receive \$500 in their February 28 paycheck.
- The final application deadline for this Early Notice Incentive is February 4, 2022.

This incentive should be considered a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2021-2022 school year and may not be offered in future years. You may schedule an appointment with Troy Bohling at 801-354-7480.
